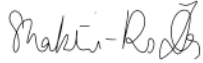

The purpose of this project is to explore the relationship between clothing, performance, and behaviour. The project seeks to generate and explore answers to the research question 'do we use clothing as a costume?', as well as to potentially bring about more question to ponder. I will 'recruit' participants by contacting said family members and friends via social media, text, telephone, email, etc. They will be asked to participant in a one-to-one interview with me, and to have photographs taken of them, alongside myself, in their favourite outfit, their home clothes, and their work clothes. Interviews will take place in the participants' bedrooms to convey an intimacy between them and the photographs. Interview questions will be based on participants' clothing, the reason behind their style, etc.

Project Outline & Role of Participant:
<p>Clothing, considered to be a form of nonverbal behaviour, is an extremely large part of our lives. Whether we mean to or not, we consider it on some level every single day. In this project, the Researcher will be exploring the relationship between clothing, performance, and behaviour by asking the question: do we use clothing as a costume?</p> <p>If the Participant consents to taking part in this project, their role will be to supply data for a case study for the Researcher to make reference to in their research. Said data supplied by the Participant will be in the form of:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none">1. a one-to-one interview, with audio to be recorded;2. and a photoshoot. <p>The interview will consist of asking questions to do with the Participant's clothing, the reason behind their style, etc. The photoshoot will require the Participant and the Researcher to both wear the Participant's favourite outfit, their home clothes, and their work clothes – taking it in turns to wear each one – in the same image. The Researcher will require use of the Participant's bedroom for the interview and photoshoot. In addition, the Researcher will need access to the Participant's clothes in order to wear them herself (this includes and is limited to the Participant's favourite outfit, their home clothes, and their work clothes).</p> <p>This research project seeks to generate and explore answers to the main research question: 'Do we use clothing as a costume?', as well as to potentially bring about more questions to ponder. The Participant's data will be used as a primary research source for both the written aspect of the research – to be in the form of a booklet – and for the exhibition piece. Said data will be at the forefront of the research, to be used as the main content. The exhibition piece itself will be a physical portrayal of the research carried out to answer the main research question.</p> <p>The Participant's data from their interviews and photoshoots will be stored on the Researcher's password-protected laptop, in a file situated under four linked folders. Any and all deleted data will go straight to the 'Trash' folder, which will then be emptied and permanently erased. Data may be viewed by the project Supervisor (see below) but will be accessible to the Researcher only.</p> <p>The overall methodology of the project involves carrying out primary research by conducting one-to-one interviews and performing photoshoots alongside Participants. For full details of the methodology, please consult the Researcher's Proposal.</p> <p>Participants may withdraw from the project at any time up until project completion on 14th May 2018.
